## *State Language Perfect Competition Results*

This is the first year that language students competed in the Victorian Language Perfect State Competition from 1<sup>st</sup> September to 8<sup>th</sup> September 2014. Over 190 state and private schools competed and Rosebud Secondary College came 23 overall for Indonesian and Japanese – a very good effort.

Special congratulations to Kelas (Class) 7E who collectively received the highest class score in Victoria for Indonesian! A massive total of 29,127 points. Hebat!! (Great) 10,000 points ahead of the second Indonesian class in the state.




As a school we came second in Victoria for Indonesian with an overall score of 50,836 points. All of the great efforts of our students, both in class and at home, contributed to this score.

# FINANCE MATTERS

## 2015 COLLEGE CHARGES

Information about our charges relating to Essential Education Items, Optional Education Items and Voluntary Contributions will be available on the college website at the beginning of next term. This information will also be provided with the 2015 Booklists which will be sent home during week 2 of next term. Also available on the website will be our Parent Payment Policy and our Parent Payment Refund Policy. A copy of each of these policies will also be available in the College foyer. Please contact the Office if you require a hard copy of either policy.

## 10% DISCOUNT

At its last meeting, School Council approved a 10% discount if 2015 Essential Education Items (excluding VET charges), are paid in full on or before the 15th December 2014. The discount cannot be applied to the VET charges as funds collected are then passed onto the VET provider.

## PAYING YOUR ESSENTIAL EDUCATION ITEMS

The College offers various methods to assist families in making payments towards these items. BPay can also be set up to make regular payments from your account, not only one off transactions. Details of the various options appear below:

## SCHOOLKIDS BONUS - Fantastic News.

As many will already be aware, those families who are eligible to receive this bonus will continue to receive this support for education-related costs of primary and secondary schooling after the Senate secured the Schoolkids Bonus until the end of 2016.

As the College is moving to a 'Managed Bring Your Own Device' program for students entering Years 7 and 10 in 2015 the continuation of the Schoolkids Bonus is well timed in providing some much needed funds for those who wish to direct this assistance to a laptop purchase. The amount payable to a family with secondary school students is \$820 in total and generally paid in January, before school starts and July.

Students currently in Years 7 - 11 will receive their 2015 Booklist in the second week of Term 4.

These are to be returned no later than **Wednesday 5th November**. Parents will have to do an on-line order should the booklist not be returned to the office by this date. # FUN IN THE SNOW


## with the Year 8's at Lake Mountain



## DISTRICT ATHLETICS

An outstanding effort by our Sports Captains, Will Harbinson and Sam Hafey- Bagg, ably assisted by Kayla D'Angelo led the way for a great day of achievements by our athletes at the recent Interschool Athletics Carnival at the Ballam Park track.



Overall the school finished second, but we were the clear winners in the Senior Girls section where our students won 12 of a possible 13 events in the open section. Kayla finished off her final year at school by winning all six of her events (400, 800, and relay). Sam was victorious in the Open 100, Hurdles and relay. Along with Ashlee Dean (Yr. 7) the girls almost clean swept the age group.

Will almost single handily took on the other school in the open age group and in character defining style, gave his utmost in each of his six events. He was victorious in the high jump, placed in others, but importantly led the way and assisted the many junior students that were competing in age groups above their own. He anchored three year 7 boys that were filling in for the open age group and showed that competing is the important part of any sporting competition. In true leadership style, he made the run important for the many junior students present.

Jiya Robinson relay and javelin and Mack Hill (First Shot Put, second Javelin) also made important contributions as Year 12's. Max Kleverkamp won four 16 year age group events (Triple, Long and High and relay). Fellow Year 11 students Liam Hyde, three wins (200, 400 and relay and second in 100). Dylan Dunstan (17 y.o. 2 wins and 4 seconds) and Cooper Corbett (relay) all stood out for that year level.

Skyla Lauch, with four wins (14 y.o. 100, 200, 400 and relay) and Ben Closter three wins (15 y.o. 200, 400 *Record*, Relay *Record*) showed real class in clearly winning their events.

A number of younger athletes ran up in a higher age group to fill in for absent students. Lily Wills competed in three age groups higher than her own as a 17 year old, won the High Jump and Hurdles. ### OUTSTANDING NETBALLER




# ~ Welfare ~

## Sexting Legislation

The Victorian Parliament is considering new laws that would change the penalties for young people involved in sexting.

Sexting refers to sending sexually explicit photos or videos electronically. This is typically done via text message, social networks, email, and mobile apps such as Snapchat. It has become increasingly common among teenagers and is an issue at secondary schools throughout Australia.

Under the new laws, young people will no longer be found guilty of child pornography charges or placed on the Sex Offenders Register if they send or receive consensual, non-exploitative sexts. Images that capture a criminal act, however, such as a sexual assault, will not fall under the new laws.

While the penalties for consensual sexting may be reduced, it's important that young people are educated to understand associated risks to their wellbeing. Once a 'sex' has been sent, there's no going back, and what may have been consensual at the time is often a cause for regret later.

[DEECD's Bully Stoppers page](#) provides information and tips to help students and parents deal with sexting and other online issues such as cybersafety and cyberbullying. Whilst we have had to assist in resolving only a few instances of issues involving inappropriate images, recent news articles for example of celebrity images being "stolen" from the "cloud" highlight just how easily young people could potentially fall into major traps. Personal security and careful forward thinking around sensitive material is crucial. Why take these photos in the first place?




