YEAR 10

Now settled into Year 10 life, students and parents need to now think about Work Experience which is on 18-22 of June. This may seem like a long time away but history shows that the students who get started early are the ones who get the Work Experience they are looking for. Use your own networks with friends, family, your local sporting clubs and any other group you may be a part of to find someone in your chosen industry who may be able to help you. Remember, Work Experience is a school-sanctioned opportunity for you to experience an industry you might be interested in. It is also a great way to gain the inside knowledge necessary to making great decisions for Years 11 and 12.

In addition to this, we will be holding our Careers Ute Muster on 27 of March. Employers from all sorts of industries will be present to answer questions that students have and share their passion for their industry. This is the starting point for the decision making process about possible future pathways.

Year 11 VCAL students have begun the Job Connexions program with Seawinds Hub. This five-session program looks at OH&S, online behaviours that can affect future prospects and how to present yourself to increase your chances of success. Students have been assigned a volunteer mentor to help them navigate this process. We thank all mentors who have given their time to this project.

Year 12

Beginning in March, we will be helping Year 12 students understand the VTAC application process and how to make good pathway choices beyond Rosebud Secondary College. This will begin for VCE students with an information session during their study periods and then students will be able to book in for individual counselling sessions. VCAL students receive this as part of their coursework but are able to make individual counselling sessions also.

VCAL students attended a Business Luncheon courtesy of our Job Connexions program with Seawinds Hub. Mentors from many different industry backgrounds were present and the group was addressed by marketing guru Winston Marsh, one year after they first met him. Students were also addressed by Tania Treasure from the Shire's Industry Development Unit to gain insight into where the opportunities for the future lie. All mentors were impressed by the self-awareness that the students showed and their understanding of their future pathways. Some photos of the day are included.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS - INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

WHAT IS A SCHOOL COUNCIL AND WHAT DOES IT DO?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within state-wide guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

WHO IS ON THE SCHOOL COUNCIL?

For most school councils, there are three possible categories of membership:

A mandated elected Parent category – more than one third of the total members must be from this category.

Department of Education and Training (DET) employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school.

A mandated elected DET employee category – members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.

An optional Community member category – members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. Department employees are not eligible to be Community members.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

WHY IS PARENT MEMBERSHIP SO IMPORTANT?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

DO I NEED SPECIAL EXPERIENCE TO BE ON SCHOOL COUNCIL?

Each member brings their own valuable life skills and knowledge to the role. Councillors may need to develop skills and acquire knowledge in areas that are unfamiliar to them. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

HOW CAN YOU BECOME INVOLVED?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term one each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO DO TO STAND FOR ELECTION?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations following the commencement of Term one each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March unless the usual time line has been varied by the Minister.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent category.

Department employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not engaged in work are eligible to nominate for parent membership of the school council at that school.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt in the mail following the receipt of your completed nomination.

Generally, if there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

REMEMBER

- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Consider standing for election to council this year
- Be sure to vote in the elections.

FINANCE NEWS

CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF) (Applications close 29 June 2018)

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) provides payments for eligible students to attend activities like:

- school camps or trips
- swimming and school-organised sport programs
- outdoor education programs, excursions and incursions.

Please note the changes for 2018 applications. See 'Submit and application'.

Who can apply: Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply. There are two criteria that must be met:

On the first day of term one (29 January 2018) or the first day of term two (18 April 2018), a parent or legal guardian of a student must be an eligible beneficiary of one of these cards:

Veterans Affairs Gold Card
Centrelink Health Care Card
Pensioner Concession Card

OR they must be a temporary foster parent

OR the student is 16 years or older and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card)

AND the parent or legal guardian must submit an application by the due date.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and 18 years.

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and 17 years of age.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, TAFE or who are home schooled.

Payment amounts:

\$125 per year for eligible primary school students & **\$225 per year for eligible secondary school students.**

Payments are made directly to the school and are tied to the student. Most payments start from March onwards.

Applications can be received over term one and two. Payments are for the application year and cannot be claimed for previous years.

Year 7 and Prep students in government schools who receive the fund are also able to get support for school uniforms.

The CSEF payment cannot be used towards voluntary school charges, books, stationery, school uniforms, before/after school care, music lessons, or formal/graduations.

Submit an application

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2017, you do not need to complete an application form in 2018 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances. Your child's school will apply for the CSEF on your behalf.

You will only need to submit an application form in 2018 if any of the following changes have occurred:

- * **new student enrolments:** your child has started or changed schools in 2018 or you did not apply at the same school in 2017 or
- * **changed family circumstances:** such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2018.

Schools are able to accept and process applications up until the end of term two each year.

CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE

Who can apply

The conveyance allowance is available to families who meet certain criteria.

Students attending a school must:

- attend their nearest government or non-government school/campus appropriate to their year level at which admission is permissible
- be enrolled at a school/campus outside Melbourne's metropolitan conveyance boundary
- reside 4.8km or more by the shortest practicable route from that school/campus attended be of school age (5 to 18 years old at time of application) and reside in Victoria.

Apply for the allowance

Families can complete an application form and submit it to their school. Conveyance Allowance for private car cannot be claimed if the journey to and from school can be made by public transport or government funded school bus.

To receive payment for Term 1 2018, claims must be received by the school no later than **Friday 2 March 2018.**

STATE SCHOOLS' RELIEF (SSR)

APPLICATIONS FOR YEAR 7 UNIFORM PACKS CLOSE AT THE END OF TERM 1 2018 (29 MARCH)

State Schools' Relief works closely with all government schools across Victoria. Each year State Schools' Relief assists families who are experiencing financial disadvantage with school clothing, shoes and other essential items.

Uniform help through State Schools' Relief

Students starting prep or year 7 in 2018 who meet the criteria for CSEF are automatically able to get help with uniforms.

What you get

State Schools' Relief will provide basic uniform items or a voucher for each student who meets the criteria.

For year 7 students

For students commencing year 7 in 2018, State Schools' Relief will provide:

- 1 Jumper/Jacket 1 Pair of shoes (Lace ups) supplied directly from State Schools' Relief
- Summer dress or trousers and shirt or shorts and shirt

How to apply

If your child received CSEF help in 2017, you do not need to apply for the same child again. Apply for CSEF before the closing date if you haven't done so before. This includes all children starting prep. For applications, see: Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund. Contact the school your child is attending in 2018 to request a uniform pack.

APPLICATIONS FOR YEAR 7 UNIFORM PACKS CLOSE AT THE END OF TERM 1 2018 (29 MARCH)

Applications for prep uniform packs will be submitted by schools in terms 2 and 3. Uniform items and vouchers may be given directly to you, or to your school. The school will contact you to pass on the items.

Vouchers

If State Schools' Relief can't supply uniform items directly, you will receive a voucher to go towards the cost of uniform items.

The voucher can be redeemed at your child's school uniform shop or an independent uniform retailer, which will be listed on the voucher.

If you receive a voucher you may need to contribute the difference in value between the voucher and the cost of the items.

The voucher will list every approved item for the student and the maximum purchase value that State Schools' Relief will contribute for each item. If uniform items cost less than the amount on the voucher, any unused amount cannot be transferred to another item, used to purchase an extra item, or provided as cash. All vouchers include an expiry date. Expired vouchers cannot be redeemed.

FAMILY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

These have been sent out in the post this week to all families. This is to let each family know if items to date have been fully paid or what items still require payment.

If your child is studying a Food Technology subject, or an Outdoor and Environmental Studies subject payment for these would be appreciated as soon as possible. Cost for these subjects covers ingredients or use of equipment/booking with outside providers for activities.

If your child is studying a VETiS subject, unless a payment plan had already been arranged, final payment was due 31st January 2018. Students may be withdrawn from the VETiS subject if it still remains unpaid after 23 February.

Payment options for all school charges include:

CASH: Payments can be made by visiting our Administration office.

CHEQUE: Payments can be made by visiting our Administration office

OR

by mailing your cheque to: Rosebud Secondary College, 245 Eastbourne Road, Rosebud 3939.

CREDIT CARD: Payments can be made by visiting our Administration office OR by telephone

EFTPOS : Payments can be made by visiting our Administration office.

ABSTUDY: This is an assistance scheme for students with an indigenous background. Please check with Centrelink to see if you qualify.

CENTREPAY: A free direct bill-paying service offered to those receiving payments from Centrelink.

Please contact Gay in the front office for more information and application form.

CSEF: Families holding a valid means-tested concession card or temporary foster parents are eligible to apply.

Eligible secondary school students, in years 7 to 12 will be paid \$225 per year which can only be used to assist in the cost of the student attending camps, sports or excursions. Payments will go directly to the school and be tied to the student.
